2020 has been delivering to us change that we had never dreamed possible, and not exactly the change we might have wished for. Regardless of what our dreams and wishes may have been, the pandemic of 2020 changed our world in ways that won't long be forgotten.

Lions clubs from lake-to lake across our great state have had to adapt to these changes by making choices. Some of our clubs have chosen to completely shelter in place until a vaccine is



available; some have chosen to modify their meeting places and styles to accommodate regulations and personal safety. World-wide, all Lions clubs are dealing with this change. Depending on which direction your club has decided upon, just know that there are still ways to serve your community and club. If you are from a club choosing to shelter, are you taking a few moments each week to call and check-in with other club members? How about a few calls to check-in on neighboring clubs in your zone? These are simple ways to defeat the snowball of depression that comes from being isolated by the virus.

Don't let the pandemic of 2020 be the reason your club gives up service to your community, and don't be afraid to continue to “Try just one more time.”

Here are just a few examples from around our MD the creativity of Lions:

- Many clubs-Like the Branch Area Lions Club - are partnering with other nonprofits to provide manpower during the pandemic. Food Banks in particular have enjoyed the help from Lions, call your nearest food bank. They always have a truck to unload, shelves to stock, packaging to be done, etc.

- Our nursing homes are full of people who have gone months without visiting their family. Some clubs send cards, even including a phone number to call, just to say hi.

- The Ovid Lions have installed Wi-Fi in their Lions Hall and have posted hours of operation so school children without internet have a warm place to keep up with their studies.

- And even during a pandemic, the leadership of District 11-D2 just chartered a new Lions Club! Welcome to the pride Deerfield Lions Club!

Finally, just so you can't say “Hey, GMT, put your money where your mouth is!”

As MD GMT, I've accepted a Tri-State membership challenge with Ohio and Indiana between December 1st and March 31st. Lions, all I ask of you is to wear your Lions pin daily, and “Just Ask, Would you be a Lion?” one more time.
