At "O dark 2" on the morning of October 30, 2005, our C-130 landed at Balad Air Base. It was "Day 1" of our 365-day countdown to go home. Balad Air Base was the home of "Camp Anaconda", the Army's logistical headquarters in Iraq and one of the major U.S. airbases. It was sixteen square miles of desert in the middle of the Sunni Triangle nicknamed "Mortarville" because it received more mortar and rocket attacks than any other Iraq base. Concrete "T walls" were placed throughout the base to



provide some protection during attacks. T-walls are concrete barriers that range from the 3 foot "Jersey" barrier (that you see on the highways) to twelve foot "Texas" barriers. There were thousands of these T-walls on Iraq military bases. A tiny fraction of them became painted memorials to units that had been there. Occasionally, there was a T-wall painted in memory of a soldier who did not make it to "Day 365". The 180th Transportation Company of Muskegon was preparing to go home when I arrived. The 180th was part of the 766th Transportation Battalion that I had commanded from 1999 to 2001. Two soldiers of the 180th Transportation Company recognized me and asked me to visit the company area. The soldiers were in good spirits and I congratulated them on a job well done. Three months later I ran across the T-wall barrier pictured with this article. It was dedicated to the memory of the 180th soldier that did not make it to "Day 365". A Gold Star Family is the immediate family of a service member who died while serving in a time of conflict. While Veteran's Day is dedicated to honor "American veterans of all wars" it reminds me to also honor the sacrifice of the families of those that gave "the last full measure of devotion."



PLANT TODAY YIELD TOMORROW!

Whenever planting seeds comes to mind, aren't we really thinking down road of the future? It is the choice of consuming the seed or planting it with the hope and the thought of getting more abundance. Isn't that so with Lions as well? And, isn't one of our favorite fields that Lions enjoy planting service, our youth? This issue of the Pride, I would like to share with you a trifecta of seeds. One that looks to and encourages a bountiful harvest for tomorrow. It centers around one well known service in Lions and two profoundly important services we Lions do. This harvest encourages our youth through sight and the ability to read. No new machinery is required. We already have all the tools in the barn and can put them to use with a minimal investment.

First, there is Project KidSight. Now sponsored throughout the state by the Lions of Michigan Foundation, Project KidSight gives us the ability to screen students in our communities with the sweet spot ages six months through six years. This is an extremely popular service that Lions throughout the Midwest and the United States participate in. It is obvious that the ability to see words affects the ability to read.

Next, there is the youth that struggle to read. Lions commonly participate in two different areas here. One is better known to Michigan than the other. Both are very important. The first of the lesser-known programs is Reading Between the Lions. The second is grades 1-3 classroom reading. The great part of these two programs? We don't even have to buy the seed! It all can be done by Lions without purchasing any materials.

Reading Between the Lions is really a play on words. People (young and old alike) frequently encounter a difficulty when reading words that are on multiple lines. For some both the cadence and the motion of the eye when going from line to line, such as in this article or a book is confusing and interrupted causing the person to lose place and comprehension. Lions in Nevada are well known for a program that can correct this, called Reading Between the Lions. In Michigan our very own PDG Bob Hohendorf has spent considerable time on this subject. He has presented at the USA Canada Forum on the subject and is an all-around great resource.

Classroom reading in grades 1 through 3 is also a great way to bring Lions to your community. With the opioid crisis of 2008 and since, many children struggle to read at this grade level. This is especially significant since there now are competency levels a child must exhibit by the end of third grade before moving to higher grade levels. The simple act of a Lion going to the local school on a regular basis and reading with children can make a lasting difference in their ability to read and comprehend. The fun part of this activity is that kids this age can really teach us something too!

So what's holding us back? Look at your local school. You might be surprised at how welcome you really are. In Lions alone we have school superintendents such as Lion Shawn Wightman, who fully embraces Lions helping in the education of our youth. Work up the courage. Go talk with your school about these programs and invest yourself. Need to scale this back a bit? No problem. Do Project KidSight with reading to youth at your local library. Maybe just start with Project KidSight. Then recruit and work up the courage to take on the next bit of the trifecta challenge. As a Lion you are a farmer of your community. Plant the seeds of caring and hope today at your local school. The harvest is helping our youth meet the challenges of tomorrow.

I recently read an article titled "The Blue Zones: Lifestyle Habits of the World's Longest-Living Populations". It was about a journalist named Dan Buettner who led a series of expeditions with National Geographic and a team of anthropologists, demographers, and scientists to discover the world's longest-living populations and the commonalities between these unique groups of people. They were able to identify five regions of the world with the largest percentage of individuals 100 years of age or older, that they called Blue Zones.

The people of these regions engage in similar lifestyle habits, such as consuming a plant-heavy diet and prioritizing tight-knit social networks. They concluded that there were nine habits that helped these communities enjoy a healthy and long life. Of the nine, I think that five are factors that membership in the Lions enhance. They are: (1) Sense of Purpose; (2) Stress Management; (3) Social Networks; (4) Spirituality and; (5) Family First.

The "60 by 60" membership campaign is about providing the opportunity to people who want to serve improve other people' lives, and their lives, though the support platform that Lions Clubs provides. Give them the opportunity to become a Lion, it may help you to live to 100 years!

Membership Application

WE ARE GLOBAL

Membership types and fees

New member
New members pay an entrance fee of US\$35 or must submit the proper waiver certification form. International dues total US \$43 annually. Dues are billed on a semi-annual basis. Additional district, multiple district and club dues may apply.

Transfer member
Transfer members in good standing pay no entrance fee when transferring to an existing club within 12 months.

Family member
The Family Membership Program provides families with the opportunity to receive a special dues discount when they join a Lions club together. The first family member (head of household) pays full international dues (US\$43), and up to four additional family members pay only half the international dues (US\$21.50). All family members pay the one-time entrance fee of US\$35.

The Family Membership Program is open to family members who are (1) eligible for Lions membership, (2) currently in or joining the same club, and (3) living in the same household and related by birth, marriage or other legal relationship. Common household family members include parents, children, spouses, aunts and uncles, cousins, grandparents, in-laws and legal dependents. Submit via MyLCI, or include the Family Unit Certification Form with the Monthly Membership Report Form (MMRF).

Student
Students between the age of majority and through age 30 pay no entrance fee and half international dues. Students over age 30 and joining a Campus Lions club pay a US\$10 entrance fee and full international dues. Submit the Student Member Certification Form (STU-5) for each student.

“What are your community's needs?”

Current or former Leo
Current or former Leos seeking membership through the age of 35, who have served as a Leo for at least a year and a day, pay half international dues and receive an entrance/charter fee waiver under the Leo-Lion membership program. You may select Leo-Lion as the membership type in MyLCI or submit the *Leo to Lion Certification* form with your MMR.

Leos over age 35 who have served as a Leo for at least a year and a day receive an entrance/charter fee waiver.

Submit the *Leo to Lion Certification Form* for credit of Leo years of service to the Lion member record for each current or former Leo.

Young adult
Young adults through the age of 30 receive an entrance fee waiver and pay half international dues when joining a Leo-Lions club.

After many years of outstanding and dedicated service, Becky Dahlke has tendered her resignation as CEO for the LMASB. The board is currently seeking applicants for this position.


QUALIFICATIONS

When I was born, I had a lot of other very important medical problems that the doctors needed to focus on, so they completely forgot to do a hearing test. After a couple of weeks at home with three dogs and noise all around me, my parents had an instinctive feeling the something was suspicious about my hearing. In fact, my grandpa clapped in my ear, and I subtly reacted, and he said "see, she can hear". Even with that, at around two weeks old, my mom took me to a doctor's appointment where they ran multiple hearing tests, and I failed all of them. My family quickly found out that I had moderate to severe hearing loss.

Throughout the 18 year of my life, I have been told by many people that I can't do this or do that, and I am pretty sure that I proved them wrong each time. When I decided to play the saxophone in the school band, the teacher told my parents that I would probably not be successful in that class, however, my parents supported whatever I wanted to do, and when I got to high school, I joined the marching band. In my junior year, I became an assistant section leader, and as a senior, I was head section leader for the saxophones. When I wasn't marching, I was first chair alto saxophone, and I played tenor saxophone in the symphony band, our highest caliber band.



SAMANTHA PROVENZANO - Livonia, Michigan
Indiana University (Kokomo) - Nursing

When I was six years old, my parents received a letter from our county that I had failed a hearing screening at my elementary school. My parents were determined to find out why I was suddenly losing my ability to hear. A CT Scan picked up something pushing on my brainstem; I underwent a ten-hour craniotomy at the University of Michigan C.S. Mott Children's Hospital to remove the mass. The doctors and nurses who cared for me were kind, gifted and passionate, and they sent me home with an amazing badge of courage, a scar with more stitches than any other kid in my school. At six years old, the heroism I recognized in my health care team was not that they saved my life, but that they got me back to the playground. My hearing loss was permanent, and I was soon fitted with my first pair of hearing aids, and a teacher consultant for the hearing impaired became part of my IEP team at my elementary school and continues today.

The 2011-12 UofM Women's Basketball Team "adopted" me through the Friends of Jaelyn Foundation, a charity that connects children with brain tumors with collegiate athletic teams. It was my introduction to something amazing, basketball. I had not idea how much I would come to love the game. When I am playing basketball, no one cares that I am hearing impaired, that I wear hearing aids or that I had a brain tumor. The hardwood is the one place I feel like I belong, and I am thankful to Indiana University Kokomo for believing in me and helping me fulfill my dream with an offer to play women's basketball while pursuing my nursing degree.



SHANNON SULLIVAN - Canton, Michigan
Schoolcraft College - Undecided

Ever since first receiving her hearing aids in kindergarten, my older sister Shannon has strived, in every way, to keep them in great shape. Amazingly, her original hearing aids lasted for years, thanks to her dedication. She would disconnect the tubes, gently brush out debris and change the batteries as needed. Although, her current hearing aids do not need nearly as much maintenance, she is still very careful with them. Regardless of her disability, Shannon has done well in her classes - last semester, she had a 3.5 cumulative grade point average. Furthermore, there have been multiple occasions when she has helped out fellow students, and when she is faced with a tricky homework assignment, it is not in here nature to give up.

Shannon will not allow whispering, staring or teasing to slow her down. By growing thick skin, she walks down hallways full of thousands of students without worry. In fact, she dislikes it when people see her as anything less than normal, so she surpasses expectations to prove she is just like everybody else.




TIA FALZARANO - Iron Mountain, Michigan
Saginaw Valley State University - Masters Degree - Public Health

I was born with severe-profound hearing loss. I wore hearing aids for 23 years, and in March 2020, I underwent the process of receiving a cochlear implant. The support I received through my audiologist, family, and friends has motivated me to continue my education. I graduated from Oakland University in 2019 with a Bachelor's Degree in Environmental Science, concentrating on Health and Safety.

The pandemic certainly is a challenge for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Community, due to lip reading being a valuable mechanism for communication. During this time, I was faced with the challenge of learning new sounds with my cochlear implant with limited access to lip reading, and I struggled to find work that was accommodating to my challenges as a new cochlear implant recipient without access to lip reading. However, I ended up working with the Macomb County Health Department for most of 2020.

I am currently working as an Infection Prevention Specialist at Dickinson County Healthcare System in the Upper Peninsula. My current position allows me to put my passion of educating others on public health information into practice while continuing my education at Saginaw Valley State University.



ZANDER BOLHUIS - Kalamazoo, Michigan
Florida Southwester University - Business

I have been deaf in my left ear since birth. I am not book-smart like my twin sister who was born without any disabilities. In fact, my sister is an overachiever in everything, and school is easy for her. I struggle with most scholarship applications because of the long essays, but my mom told me about a scholarship for the hearing impaired, and I was excited about the opportunity to apply.

I am sure all of the students applying for this scholarship are deserving, but I have a few reasons why I think I am deserving. Although my hearing impairment has created challenges over the years, I always maintain a positive attitude. I have advocated for myself in school and with sports, and at one time, I was a tri-athlete. I have maintained good grades and kept up with other kids in my class, and I have tried to break stereotypes associated with hearing loss.

There has definitely been challenges over the years due to my hearing impairment. I was bullied either because of my hearing aids or because I couldn't hear, but I always stood up for myself, and I think in doing so, I stood up for others as well. I know I cannot change my disability, but I can work with what I have and help others see that I can be successful regardless of my hearing impairment.




