

involved with the youth in your area? Creating a lasting relationship with the children in your area means you are also in their parents' lives. Parents are potential members, and those kids are our future members

There's so much your club and even you as an individual can do to make families aware of Lions International. Support youth sports by donation and attend events as a club wearing Lions gear to show your community you are there. The Three Rivers Lions Club (11-B2) have attended sporting events holding encouraging signs on the sideline and even stocked the team with snacks. The St. Joseph Lions Club (11-B2) invite youth coaches to their meetings to hear updates on what has and will be happening. The South Haven Black River Lions (11B2) donated to the Rocket Football & Cheer team to support their season with their names on a large banner at each game. This is just a few examples of how supporting youth sports gets your club known in your community getting parent interest to join and telling the kids Lions exist.

Clubs can hold their own community events aimed towards youth as well. The Mattawan Lions Club (11B2) has an annual Easter Carnival and Christmas Stocking give away bringing a ton of community members and their kids out for free to low-cost fun. The Bangor Lions Club has an annual Bunny Hop working with local businesses and other community groups to hold a fun and free outing for kids.

The District 11B2 Kidsight team lead by Lions Tanda and David Stiffler has over 80 volunteers with about 20 core members that perform vision screenings on kids in many school districts and events. District 11B2 leads Michigan in the number of kids screened each year hitting a new record of 20,177 screenings and 2,133 referrals so far! They are not even done yet! I'm so proud of this amazing team showing amazing community support to the families in our District. Not only do we hear from grateful parents but we are also getting emails and letters from teachers, superintendents, and other community groups saying how amazing our Kidsight program is.

The best way to encourage future membership from our youth is to start a Cub or Leo Club in your area. I would not be a Lion today if I hadn't become a Bangor Leo Club member in High School. You can start a school or community club. You can even work with a neighboring club to start an area Leo Club. Working together will help these kids gain community service experience, gain relationships with your Lion members, and hopefully grow a passion for giving back that will lead to future members. 

NEW POLICY ON ELECTING MD11 COUNCIL CHAIR

At the December Council of Governors meeting the District Governors voted to change the process for electing a council chair. PID Justin Faber introduced this new process.

The new policy states that each year it is the responsibility of the incoming Second Vice District Governors to select a Council Chairperson, in order to meet the deadline imposed by Lions Clubs International and to allow for a smooth transition between Council Chairpersons, and to have a leader for the Council in place by the International Convention.

What does this mean, exactly? It means that you have the opportunity to apply and interview for the position of the 2025-2026 Council Chair during the MD 11 Convention in May! The seated 2nd VDGs will conduct the interviews and select their Council Chair for the term of 2025-2026. The Council Chair-Elect will serve as Vice Council Chair for the 2024-2025 term, under the leadership of Council Chair Elect Terri Huffman.

In December 2024, elections will be held for the position of the 2026-2027 Council Chair. This will allow for multiple opportunities to work as a team with your council while working together as the Council of Governors for a longer term than the typical one-year period.

Interested Lions may fill out the application form and send it along with a letter of interest to Executive Director Wendy Burns. Emailed or mailed copies are accepted. Deadline to submit an application is May 6, 2024. SIGHT CONSERVATION/WHITE CANE COMMITTEE-LION ROGER BOSSE, MD 11GHAR

It has been a pleasure to serve as chair of this committee for the last three years and I am grateful to the leadership for trusting me with the responsibility. It's time for me to step down, and I want to thank all the Lions who have served with me, and contributed their time and service to the cause. White Cane week is approaching, and our Governor has issued a proclamation to recognize the week of April 26 to May 5 as Michigan's White Cane week. In honor of that, I thought it would be worth reprinting this article from 2021, submitted by Charis Austin, White Cane/ Sight Conservation Committee with an expansion of the last section on supporting persons who are blind or low vision.

The White Cane Committee has received many questions regarding the history of the white cane as well as questions regarding White Cane Safety Day, also known as the Blind Americans Equality Day.

The use of the white cane began in 1921, when James Biggs, an artist in Bristol, England lost his sight and decided to paint his walking stick white to make himself more visible to oncoming motorists. A year later the practice of using a white cane was adopted in the United States. In 1930, the first White Cane Ordinance was passed in Peoria, Illinois, granting pedestrians who are blind "protections and the right-of-way while carrying a white cane. the following year, the Lion's Club International launched a national campaign promoting the use of white canes by persons who are blind. By the end of World War II, as blind veterans began using canes to help them return home, the white cane began to make its way into government policy as a symbol of blind independence. Lions Clubs often use the first week in May a time to celebrate White Cane Day. Fundraising events are often held, but they do not need to be limited to this schedule.

During the early 1960's, several state organizations and rehabilitation agencies serving the blind and visually impaired community urged Congress to declare October 15th as White Cane Safety Day. Their effort came to fruition on October 6, 1964, when a joint resolution of the Congress, HR 753, was signed into law authorizing the President of The United States of America to proclaim October 15th of each year as White Cane Safety Day. On October 15, 2000, former president Bill Clinton acknowledged the significance of the white cane. "With proper training, people using the white cane can enjoy greater mobility and safety by determining the location of steps, curbs, uneven pavement, and other obstacles in their path."

Independence is more than getting around safely. It includes any kind of daily living activity. What can you do to support people who are blind or visually impaired? The following was taken from a document prepared by the Ann Arbor Host Lions for the 2018 District 11-B1 Convention, entitled Disability Etiquette.

Skills or talents you bring to the position:

People who are Blind know how to orient themselves and get around on a street. They are competent to travel unassisted, though they may use a cane or a guide dog.

- Identify yourself before you make physical contact by telling them your name.
 Offer your arm don't take theirs- if they need to be guided. People who are blind
- Offer your arm don't take theirs- if they need to be guided. People who are blind may need their arms for balance.
- If the person has a guide dog, ask which side you should walk on.
- If you are giving directions, give specific, non-visual information, say "Walk forward to the end of this aisle and make a full right". Yes, the blind person will know where then end of the aisle is.
- Of you need to leave a person who is blind, inform them you are leaving and ask if they need anything before you leave.
- Don't touch the person's cane or guide dog (this also means don't look at or talk to the guide dog). The dog is working and needs to concentrate. The cane is part of the individual's personal space. Off to read writing information.
 A person who is blind might want to know where their food is on the plate. Use
- A person who is blind might want to know where their food is on the plate. Use a clock orientation, 12 o'clock is furthest from them, 6 o'clock is nearest. Ask if they would like garnishes and anything that is not edible removed from the plate. People with Low Vision
- May need written material in large print (18 pt. or larger)
- Good lighting is important, it shouldn't be too bright. In fact, very shiny paper or walls can produce a glare that disturbs people's eyes.
- Keep walkways clear of obstructions.

WHITE CANE UPDATES 2024

MD PROPOSED DUES INCREASE <

MULTIPLE DISTRICT 11 PROPOSED DUES INCREASE

The subject of a dues increase for Multiple District 11 was discussed at a Council of Governors meeting after it was recommended by MD 11 Council Treasurer Paul Hemeryck. A committee was appointed to review and make a report a to the Council of Governors with a recommendation. Based on the committee's report the Council of Governors approved the following resolution to be presented and voted on by the club delegates at the Multiple District 11 Convention Business Meeting to be held on Saturday, May 17th at the Marriott Sheraton Hotel in Grand Rapids to be voted:

Resolved That Article VIII Section 1 the administrative fund tax (member dues) be increased to \$12.00 effective July 1, 2024 with semi-annual payments of \$6.00 be collected September 10, 2024 and March 10, 2025; and Be it further Resolved That the dues be increased to \$14.00 with semi-annual payments of \$7.00 be collected September 10, 2025 and March 10, 2026 and each year thereafter.

This requires an amendment to Article VIII, Section 1 of the MD11 By-laws.

Currently Article VIII Section 1 reads:

Section 1. MULTIPLE DISTRICT REVENUE. To provide revenue for approved multiple district projects and to defray the administrative expenses of the multiple district, an annual multiple district administrative fund tax of \$10.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the multiple district and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$5.00 per club member on September tenth of each year to cover the semi-annual period July 1 to December 31; and \$5.00 per club member on March tenth of each year, to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to be based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectively. Said tax shall be paid to the council secretary/ treasurer by each club in the multiple district, except newly chartered and reorganized clubs, which shall collect and pay said tax on a pro-rata basis from the first day of the second month following the date of their organization or reorganization, as the case may be. Said tax shall be disbursed only for administrative expenses of the multiple district and only upon approval by the Council of Governors. Disbursement therefrom shall be by checks drawn and signed by the council secretary-treasurer and countersigned by the council chairperson.

The proposed new amendment would read as follows:

Section 1. MULTIPLE DISTRICT REVENUE. To provide revenue for approved multiple district projects and to defray the administrative expenses of the multiple district, a multiple district administrative fund tax of \$12.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the multiple district and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$6.00 per club member on September tenth of 2024, to cover the semi-annual period July 1 to December 31; and \$6.00 per club member on March tenth of 2025, to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to be based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectively.

Section 2. An annual multiple district administrative fund tax of\$14.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$7.00 per club member on September tenth of each year following to cover the semi-annual period July 1 through December 31; and \$7.00 per club member to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectfully.

Said tax shall be paid to the council secretary/treasurer by each club in the multiple district, except newly chartered and reorganized clubs, which shall collect and pay said tax on a pro-rata basis from the first day of the second month following the date of their organization or reorganization, as the case may be. Said tax shall be disbursed only for administrative expenses of the multiple district and only upon approval by the Council of Governors. Disbursement therefrom shall be by checks drawn and signed by the council secretary-treasurer and countersigned by the council chairperson.

LET ME BE YOUR SERVANT...

In many of my talks there is a graphic that Lindy (my lovely wife) drew. It is a triangle with the words **Service**, **Leadership** and



Membership on each leg respectively. In the center of the triangle is the word **FUN!** The triangle works as it is one of the strongest shapes architecturally (and philosophically) known. It very neatly draws attention to some very important points in Lions.

The latest version of the graphic is with the word Service on the base of the triangle. So it is with our very organization. Service is at the very base of what we do and are known for. Hence, "We Serve". Each side of the triangle is related to – or touching the other sides of the triangle. After all each of these "pillars" are interrelated. The central core of the triangle is FUN!

In May we are at a crossroads in the year, where we are switching out servants, bringing in servants and celebrating the work of many of our servants at the conventions around the state. Servants are being honored. Servants are even exchanging information on how to serve better. In the event it was missed (not certain how anyone could), the characterization was just made that as Lions we all are servants! As an adult she became a tireless advocate for people with disabilities. And in 1925, she attended the Lions Clubs International Convention and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." The Lions accepted her challenge, and our work, ever since, has included sight programs aimed at preventable blindness.



Then they must sign this form at the convention and receive a delegate sticker from the Certification Desk. 
