We cannot move forward and carve the path to our future without looking back and remembering our roots and where we came from.

Thought you might like to know.....

We are going to dedicate this column in our upcoming issues with the idea of promoting maybe a small tidbit on things you just might like to know.

Our first article is going to cover some information about Project KidSight. As Lions, we are all aware of the fact that Helen Keller was the one that challenged us to become champions for the blind. In accepting this challenge you as a Lion should hold a great sense of pride for all the wonderful contributions we have made, as well as the ones we continue to make. One of the areas we contribute to is labeled as Project KidSight. But are you aware of exactly what that's all about? Going forward the purpose of this article is to enlighten you with the information something we thought you might like to know.

Over time, it was discovered there are 19 million children that are living with some type of vision disorder. That equates to about 1 out of 5 preschoolers. Yet less than 22% of preschool children receive some type of vision screening. It's a difficult fact to swallow despite all the efforts put forth by the Center For Disease Control and our local county and district health departments, this number continues to grow. The largest vision disorder our children are suffering from is called amblyopia or lazy eye. What it actually is, is reduced vision in one eye caused by abnormal vision development early in life. What is actually taking place is the weaker eye or lazy eye, often wanders inward or outward. This can begin at infancy or early childhood. The brain as it develops begins to favor the better eye, allowing the weaker eye to fail to develop and slowly becoming worse over time. If left untreated, this may lead to the one eye becoming functionally blind.

The good news is this can be corrected! The earlier the detection, the easier the correction. That in a nutshell is what Project KidSight is all about. Through the marvels of medicine and scientific study, a camera has been developed that through a very split second photo can help screen for the eye affliction along with some others as well. The camera's themselves were developed as a simple easy to use screening tool that through that split second photo can help supply ophthalmologist with vital information complete with useful measurements that can assist them in not only diagnosing but treating the issue our children may be facing.

The camera's that are currently being utilized in our Project KidSight are the Plus Optix S12 and the WelchAllyn Spot VS100. Both camera's can capture a successful reading 97% of the time and can be used on ages 5 months and up. But just like getting kids to pose for that perfect picture, all KidSight vision screeners know the value of creating an attentive face.

These camera's also carry an 89.5% accuracy rating for detection of an eye abnormality. So the goal of Project KidSight is to screen as many children as we can. From daycares, preschool, and elementary schools, anywhere our young children might be, we'd like to be there too! And we can always use help. If you or someone you know might have an interest, reach out and let us know. The book vending machine is an affordable extension to any library or other high traffic areas such as recreational areas, grocery stores, community centers, hospitals and your local city hall. This is the perfect solution to provide services to neighborhoods that cannot support a full library. The possibilities are endless. According to my latest research on a book vending machine, it can hold up to 500 books depending on the size of the vending machine. It can hold hard covers, soft covers and DVD'S. It can be setup for a library card. The usual measurements are around 72" H, 37.8"D, 44"W.

At the website global vending group.com, it introduces the Inchy Bookworm Vending machine. If interested, the number is 1-866-430-8317. This machine holds around 200-300 books. All you have to do is contact them for information and presto, you are on your way. Please contact your local school to see if they would like this idea and help them. Another sight is tonvend.com. Here it introduces another type or brand of a book vending machine. Again the possibilities are endless on these book vending machines. Just type in book vending machine on your search engine and watch what comes up. Check it out and let's get going on this idea.

Hopkins of Grand Rapids to design and build the magnificent houses and City Barn for Hackley and his partner Thomas Hume with construction taking place between 1887 and 1889. Structurally restored to its 1890s appearance, the Hackley House is a unique example of Victorian architecture and late nineteenth century interior decorative arts. Nationally known artisans from Chicago and New York used original samples uncovered during restoration to bring the elaborate interior stenciling and the 13-color exterior paint scheme back to life.

Hume House

Filled with spacious living areas and nine bedrooms decorated with simple patterns, the house was designed for comfort and a large family. The family expanded the house creating a beautiful library, A large dining room with geometric tile flooring, and a sleeping porch off a second floor bedroom with a terne metal floor. The exterior of the Hume House exhibits its original 14-tone restored color scheme.

City Barn

The term City Barn refers to its function and location; literally a barn that sits in the city. The barn, shared by the families housed horses, equipment, and two coachmen in living quarters on the Second floor. The City Barn incorporates elements from both houses, such as the onion dome, which reflects the Moorish influence of the Hackley House, and the turret, which matches the turret on the Hume House.

Tickets can be purchased in the City Barn located between the Hackley and Hume Houses at 484 Webster Ave.
