Working together, all of us can ensure that local students have access to healthy, life-affirming food to help them thrive and foster their limitless potential.

Join us on Friday night for a service project to be held at Kids' Food Basket, Grand Rapids. 7:00 pm – 9:00 pm. KFB is located at 1300 Plymouth NE, Grand Rapids, as we pack up 200 food packets.

Kids' Food Basket supplies thousands of children in West Michigan with a Sack Supper to ensure they have increased access to healthy food each day. Once the packs are ready, volunteers from KFB will add a fresh vegetable and fruit in a decorative bag to turn it all into a Sack Supper, ready to be delivered to a child's school. Lions can help to supply and package the contents of these meals at the KFB location in Grand Rapids during our service project night on Friday, February 24, starting at 7:00 p.m. Whether you are attending the Michigan Lions Forum or just driving in to participate in this service opportunity, all are welcome!

To ensure each child is receiving the same meal, we ask for no substitutions to the items on the preferred list. Any brand of the following items is welcome, and each district is asked to supply the following items with include 4 snacks per/bag in addition to the fresh fruit and vegetable to be added at delivery. Each district is asked to bring 100 of the items listed to help fill 200 snack packs.

District B1/B2 Fruit Cup or Pouch (no foil tops please)

District C1/C2 Pretzel, Cheez-it or Goldfish bag (1.5 oz or smaller)

In 2008 my Club, the Livonia Lions Club had 25 members. I was the youngest at age 50. Other area Lions Clubs were closing (Redford Township, Farmington Area, Madonna

University), and if we didn't change our ways, we would follow suit. What to do?

We established our "Reach Out" Initiative to increase community awareness of Lionism, to increase the communities engagement with Lionism and ultimately to increase membership opportunities.

Over the past 14 years we have "Reached Out" to our community in a variety of ways. We established and recently updated our website (www.LivoniaLionsClub.org). We established and regularly update our Facebook page (livoniahighnoonerslionsclub). We joined the local Chamber of Commerce, produced and distributed club literature, published club articles in the local paper as well as area business newsletters and social media blogs and we increased our hands on service activities within our service area. We conducted an annual "Meet the Lions" Member Recruitment Event and utilized the Lions Club/Business Liaison Program to identify and welcome new members to our Club. We established a network of Community Service Clubs and partnered with them on major area service products such as Meal Packing Events and Bed Building Events. We embraced Social media and now publicize many of our Clubs Activities on Facebook. Utilizing these approaches has helped increase Community awareness of Lionism and helped us to identify many prospective members to welcome into Lionism.

Today the Livonia Lions Club has 42 members. 90% of our current membership has joined our Club since we started "Reaching Out" in 2008 and their collective focus is to serve their community. We raise more funds, do more hands on community service and continue to position our Club to continue to be stewards of Lionism for the foreseeable future.

I invite every Club in MD11/SD10 to use your best efforts to "Reach Out" to your community to promote awareness of Lionism and welcome new members to your Club. Once those members are on board, help them find the satisfaction of helping others and they will become Lions for Life!

By now many Lions have heard of "GMA" or "Global Membership Approach". Did you know that the term Global Membership Approach stood for two different things? First, there is the Global Membership "Process". This refers to how we do GMA. The second term we use as Global Membership Approach are the "Objectives" or "Focus" when we add in the training element. So we have both "methodology" and "goals" in mind when we talk about the term Global Membership Approach. Said in another way we have a "roadmap" to show us the way and a "destination" of where we want to go. The GMA objectives are encouraging more people to become Lions, building new clubs, engaging Lions in meaningful service and training our Lions to do all this. Contrasting that with the GMA "process" which gives us a consistent approach to getting these goals done. This is an important distinction as the "process" can and should be used for most of the things we do as Lions. Permit me to expand on the process.

As already stated, the GMA Process is the method we approach, or roadmap if you will, that is used to get to our goals. The process is broken into 4 parts. Build a Team, Build a Vision, Build a Plan and Build a Success. When we look at each one of these individually, it easy to see what Lions Clubs International has done. They are teambuilding to accomplish specific goals. Even more so they have broken the steps of teambuilding up into easily accomplishable steps for success of our service goals!

Here is where we can really use the power of our organization to leverage and help our service that we do as Lions become reality. As you are planning your next service endeavor that seems too large to accomplish, think about applying the "process" of GMA to define goals that we want to accomplish. This process can (and should) be used at the multiple district, district and club levels. Let's use an example to help clarify this. We'll base our example on the district level. We'll use Project KidSight as our committee (or "team" if you will) that exists in many districts in this example. We all understand that Project KidSight screens eyesight in youth.

Our Project KidSight Committee (team) meets at the district level. The team consists of Lions or maybe even a community member at large that is interested in screening the eyes of our youth. So we have a Team! Our team meets and discusses with Lions and non-Lions what they really would like to accomplish this coming year. For instance, maybe we screened the eyes of children at the local Easter egg hunt every year, but this year there is a new parochial school that was built that needs this service as well. We are building our "vision" of what we really should be doing in the

community. Several of the Project KidSight Team sit down to "plan" this expansion of need. They come up with some "customized" goals that can be written down. Finally, the Lions in the district work to make this a reality. So what have we done? We built a team. For the most part it was in place from last year. Maybe we had to encourage a new member or two. As a team we built a vision of what we wanted to do. Form there we created a plan and wrote it down as a "custom goal" so that it could be transmitted to all of the Lions and community as a concise plan that could be followed and if necessary bettered. Finally, we carried out that plan. All the ingredients of a "Custom Goal".

Why make goals? That's pretty simple too. It engages both Lions and communities. It clearly transmits the "what we intend to do" part to many people without misinterpretation. With an army of people or a pride of Lions we can accomplish many great things. Why write goals down? We know that by writing them down we can communicate our goals. We also know from experience that written goals are much more likely to be accomplished than unwritten goals. As Lions we accomplish great things. We accomplish even more when we have all of us along with our communities pulling in the same direction. Finally post those goals so that everyone knows our direction. Check out the GMA Process on our website: www.lionsclubs.org/global.

Happy New Year Lions! One thing I am happy to be part of is our Lions organization and the difference it has made in my life and those around me.

PDG Ronald Coleman has worked tirelessly representing the spirit of Lions Clubs International since 1979 when as a young man he joined the Detroit Renaissance Lions Club sponsored by his step father, Lion Robert M Walker. Since that time, his accomplishments in the State, District and Club Levels are well noted. He has held positions from Club President (twice) to District Governor with many, many other positions and awards given along the way.

He has organized and co-organized 4 Lions Clubs, (Detroit Westown Hartford Lions Club; Detroit Medical Center Lions Club, Detroit Healthy Lions Club, Detroit Greater St. John Lions Club most recently Michigan Cyber Lions Club. Since Ronald believes in mentoring New Lions, he has sponsored more than 30 Lions.

Four accomplishments that are the most special to him as a Lion are probably not the most well known of his efforts. The first, in 1992 while serving as Public Relations Chair for Governor Bob Smoke, when he coordinated a project to increase public awareness of Lions using billboards and posters. The second in 1999, representing Lions all over Michigan he helped raise money to buy food and was part of a two man effort with great risk, to deliver money and food to Piao Columbia after it was devastated by an earthquake. The third was 2001 when after a call from International Director Lion Salim Moussan of Lebanon District 351, who he met at an International convention, asked Lion Ron to assist Lion Fouad Beydoun in the formation of what would become the "International Association of Organ Donations". This effort led to a partnership with the former Secretary of State, Terry Lynn Land to increase ways to register individuals to become donors. And fourth, he guided the process to win a \$200,000 Core Four Grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation to reduce drug use in children, also known as Lions Quest.

As a family man Lion Ron has 3 children, Ronald Mark and twins Jill and Jason, 5 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren, and he enjoys fishing, boating, hunting and playing with constant companions, his two other" furry" children, Chase and Phoebe. His wife, Lion La Wonna supports him in his efforts and thinks he's one awfully special guy.

Lots of people still love the look and feel of old-fashioned paper-and-ink books. Young kids may like turning the sturdy pages in board books. Older kids may like dog-earing a page corner or jotting their thoughts down on sticky notes to mark key passages.

There are a bunch of programs like Book Trust and Reading Is Fundamental that partner with schools to help kids choose free or low-cost books for their home libraries. Here are five more places where you can find free hard copies for your child.

1. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

The country singer started Imagination Library, a program that mails free books each month to kids ages 0–5. It launched in 1995 and now mails kids more than 1 million free books each month. Enter your zip code to see if the program is in your community. If it's not, you can apply to start a local chapter.

2. Little Free Libraries

Little Free Libraries are free book-sharing boxes where anyone can take or share a book. So far, volunteers have installed more than 90,000 book-sharing boxes near sidewalks and other places people tend to walk by. The goal is to provide 24/7 access to free books.

Enter your zip code to look for a Little Free Library near you. If you live in an area where there aren't any libraries nearby, you can apply for a free book-sharing box

and a starter set of books. More than 1,000 of these "impact libraries" have been donated so far.

3. Freecycle, Facebook, and Craigslist

Everything offered on Freecycle is free — all you have to do is pick it up. With more than 9 million members, chances are good there's a Freecycle group near you. Search the offers for kids' books or you can post a wanted ad.

Facebook is another place to look for people giving away free kids' books. Search local parent groups and also on its Marketplace section. You can also search the "Free Stuff" section on Craigslist to find people who are giving away books and learning games.

4. Book Exchanges and Book Banks

Search online to see if your community has a book exchange or a book bank. Book exchanges encourage visitors to trade in books. Book banks simply give books away.

Some book banks partner with schools and community groups to distribute free books to kids. But some are open to the public. For example, the Maryland Book Bank in Baltimore lets kids ages 13 and under take as many books as they can carry. Teens and adults can take up to 25 books per visit — one visit per month.

5. Libraries and Bookmobiles

Don't forget about your local library as a great place to borrow countless books for free. Libraries offer lots of other free learning resources, too. If it's hard for you to get there in person, ask your library if it has a bookmobile. There are hundreds of these in the U.S. If your library has one but it doesn't stop near you, ask about adding another stop.

You can also ask your local library if it offers mail order. Some libraries will deliver straight to your door — at no cost to you.

Another topic to bring up with your local library: book giveaways! Many libraries give away piles of books from time to time. Ask your library if it has free kids' books available or when it expects to give some away.

PDG Connie Shelton broke the barrier in District A2 when elected to serve as their first female District Governor in 2008-2009.
