International Board of Directors Approves Revised Dues Adjustment

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The board recently approved a new dues adjustment model that will be voted on at the 2021 International Convention.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues by \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2022
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and others tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand and our membership.

There are many ways to serve the membership of MD 11. Participating as a district representative on one of our many State Committees is one of several opportunities.

Below is a list of all State Committees. In addition to committee members, some of the State Chairperson terms will expire June 30, 2020.



Austin Clarke attends Western Michigan University and is pursuing a career in fashion merchandising. Austin doesn't let his visual impairment hold him back from anything. He is an ice skater and a member of the WMU waterski team. He organized the "Skate to See" fundraiser, helping to raise \$1,500.00 for retinal research. Famous around high school and WMU as the guy with the cool sneakers, he realized fashion merchandising was his calling. "Many people may think that living with a visual impairment is unbearable, and it may feel like it at times, but living with one gives me a chance to prove everyone wrong, including myself. Overcoming things is a great feeling and I will never stop no matter how many obstacles get in my way. I am honored to share my story with you."



Elizabeth Dunn is pursuing a Master's Degree in Social Work at Western Michigan University. Blind since birth, Elizabeth states this has become a positive characteristic that helps her observe and move through the world in her own unique way. She is committed to advocate for the increased positive representation, inclusion and equity of all people in minority groups. Her volunteer experiences include helping young blind children learn adaptive living skills, and she will use her creative talents to advocate for the representation of blind people in the Grand Rapids artistic community as well as the city's ArtPrize events. The resources of this scholarship will aid in her journey to help others through her Master's in Social Work.





Victor Marques is a graduate assistant at Western Michigan University while in his second year of pursuing a Master of Arts degree in Vision Rehabilitation Therapy at WMU. Victor lost his vision in 2010 due to a diagnosis of Retinitis Pigentosa. He is a professional musician, has held leadership roles as club president and vice-president of Toastmasters in the Portage area, and has been asked to serve as finance director to assist the Renewed Hope Free Health Clinic in Allegan. Victor has taught himself the necessary skills to become independent and has become proficient in braille reading and writing. This scholarship will aid in the purchase of specialized equipment to assist him with his career and daily communications. - (1) A driver of a vehicle shall not approach a crosswalk or any other pedestrian crossing without taking all necessary precautions to avoid accident or injury to a blind pedestrian carrying a cane or using a dog guide or walker.
- (2) A driver who approaches a crosswalk or any other pedestrian crossing without taking all necessary precautions to avoid accident or injury to a blind pedestrian carrying a cane or using a dog guide or walker is liable in damages for any injuries caused the blind pedestrian. A blind pedestrian who does not carry a cane or use a dog guide or walker has all of the rights and privileges conferred upon any other pedestrian by the laws of this state. The failure of a blind pedestrian to carry a cane or use a dog guide or walker shall not be treated as evidence of negligence in a civil action for injury to the blind pedestrian or for the blind pedestrian's wrongful death.
- (3) If a person alleges to a peace officer a violation of subsection (1), the peace officer shall investigate the alleged violation. The prosecuting attorney shall review the peace officer's investigative report to determine whether a violation of subsection (1) has occurred and whether to issue charges. Upon the request of the blind pedestrian and after reviewing the investigative report, a prosecuting attorney shall inform the blind pedestrian of his or her decision and the reason or reasons supporting that decision.


United States Area) for their approach in working together between Lions years. MD11 is working on both membership and PR opportunities that are being noticed. Keep up the teamwork!

Forget about that long winter we just got through. Time to "spring forward" into a new season. Be the Lion that brings a new positive season to your club and district.





Lion Dave lived by the motto, "Strengthen the Ties to Lionism Through Service."



Lions Hall of Fame Inductions PDG Dave Bennett, August 2, 2014 Lions of Michigan lost a giant this month, Lion "Big Al" Kassin, Founder of Lions Bear Lake Camp. Al became a Lion in 1967 in Boyne City, and transferred to the Lake Orion Lions Club in 1973 when he took the job as Camp Manager at Camp Franklin in Lake Orion. Camp Franklin was a camp for kids from Detroit, and Al had an idea to have a one-week camp session for visually impaired children. He approached the club and



it was approved for a one week session in 1982, and with camp growth the session was expanded to two weeks in 1984.

The camp continued at Camp Franklin until 1989 when the agency that owned it, Franklin-Wright Settlements, decided to sell the property. Camp was held at Camp Franklin for the last time in 1990, then moved to various locations until 1999.

During all of those years, Lion Al and committee were out tirelessly looking for a permanent home for the

camp. They were trying to raise money for the operation, and told everyone they met about the camp to bring more awareness. The camp was unique in its programs for visually impaired children.

In 1990, they were contacted about a camp in Mayfield Township just north of Lapeer, and after much work and negotiation, the camp property was purchased in 1992. Lion Al's dream had come true!

Lion Al continued to work on behalf of the camp, establishing the infrastructure that remains today. He also worked and was successful in making Lions Bear Lake Camp a Multiple District Project, affording the camp support from clubs all around Michigan.

Lion Big Al served as club president, district governor, and was the recipient of many awards, including Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, S. A.



Dodge, and Ambassador of Good Will. He was also elected to the Lions of Michigan Foundation Hall of Fame. He will be sorely missed by many, and now it is up to Lions to continue his work.

The White Cane Committee has received many questions regarding the history of the white cane as well as questions regarding White Cane Safety Day, also known as the Blind Americans Equality Day.

The use of the white cane began in 1921, when James Biggs, an artist in Bristol, England lost his sight and decided to paint his walking stick white to make himself more visible to oncoming motorists. A year later the practice of using a white cane was adopted in the United States. In 1930, the first White Cane Ordinance was passed in Peoria, Illinois, granting pedestrians who are blind "protections and the right-of-way while carrying a white cane. the following year, the Lion's Club International launched a national campaign promoting the use of white canes by persons who are blind. By the end of World War II, as blind veterans began using canes to help them return home, the white cane began to make its way into government policy as a symbol of blind independence. Lions Clubs often use the first week in May a time to celebrate White Cane Day. Fundraising events are often held, but they do not need to be limited to this schedule.

During the early 1960's, several state organizations and rehabilitation agencies serving the blind and visually impaired community urged Congress to declare October 15th as White Cane Safety Day. Their effort came to fruition on October 6, 1964 when a joint resolution of the Congress, HR 753, was signed into law authorizing the President of The United States of America to proclaim October 15th of each year as White Cane Safety Day. On October 15, 2000, former president Bill Clinton acknowledged the significance of the white cane. "With proper training, people using the white cane can enjoy greater mobility and safety by determining the location of steps, curbs, uneven pavement, and other obstacles in their path."

Independence is more than getting around safely. It includes any kind of daily living activity.



Besides a welcome and keynote by District Governor David Anderson, we included some of our popular activities of Winter Camp, including a prayer service, led by Mike Geno and a craft activity led by Denise Griffin (formerly of the Michigan Center Lioness). Birding by Ear by Donna Posont, a naturalist

with U of M, and lively discussion on new technology and adaptive tools was facilitated by Brianna Simmons, JJ. Medaugh, and Collette Mattox of WMU. A talent show and memories of camp was our final segment,



using audio, videos, and live participation by campers. Most of the sessions are available on the Winter Camp YouTube channel, along with videos submitted by the campers. PDG Roger Spriggs wrote a wonderful account of the day, portions of which may appear in this Lion Pride.

The campers had fun, and really enjoyed getting the gift cards, and even had fun using Zoom to hear their friends from camp. It was a very enjoyable day, and the campers have responded to our upcoming series of Winter Camp Chats, which will take

place on the third Saturday of the month. Our next chat will be April 17 at 1 pm. Please contact us if interested in joining. I want to thank the Winter Camp team of District 11-B1, made up of Lions Bea Furman — Co-Chair (Jackson Host), Mike Head (Dexter), Barry and Peggy Allen (Manchester), Jerry Mackey, PDG Roger Spriggs (Cereal City), John Koerner (Pennfield), Cathy Koning (Ann Arbor Evening), and Ron Kohmesher (Clinton). These dedicated Lions put in many hours putting together the elements for a successful, smooth running event. 
