What is diabetes? Diabetes is a chronic condition that occurs when the pancreas can no longer make insulin, or the body cannot effectively use insulin.

Insulin is a hormone made by the pancreas that acts like a key to let glucose from the food we eat pass from the bloodstream into the cells in the body to produce energy. The body breaks down all carbohydrate foods into glucose in the blood, and insulin helps glucose move into the cells.

When the body cannot produce or use insulin effectively, this leads to high blood glucose levels, called hyperglycaemia. Over the long-term high glucose levels are associated with damage to the body and failure of various organs and tissues.


Service doesn't need to take a lot of time or effort, just a little imagination and recognition. If you can identify a need this time of the year, your club should try to fill it.

GETTING ON THE SAME PAGE

The world of marketing and public relations can sometimes feel like a maze of jargon and acronyms. Why should our Lions Club marketing volunteers understand the lingo? Expectations for results and success often depend on a more accurate understanding of the terms used. Here's a concise glossary to help you navigate the language often used interchangeably by those outside of the marketing and public relations professions:

MARKETING: The ongoing two way asymmetrical process of planning, changing and executing the conception, pricing, promotion and distribution of ideas, goods, and services to create opportunities for exchanges that satisfy organizational objectives and meet the wants and needs of those in targeted markets.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: The ongoing process of maintaining two way symmetrical relationships and goodwill between all publics or stakeholders inside and outside the organization and the organization's management through researching the interests of publics, planning and recommending change in an organization's actions, communicating those actions to publics and evaluating the results of those communications.

ADVERTISING: Any paid form of non-personal communication through a media about a product, service, or idea initiated and paid for by the organization as an identified sponsor.

PUBLICITY: News carried unpaid in the media about an organization and its products, services, ideas, policies, personnel, or actions for which placement is initiated by the organization.

PUBLIC INFORMATION: News or other form of non-personal communication made available to publics, especially the media, concerning an organization and its products, services, ideas, policies, personnel, or actions for which placement or communication is initiated by the publics.

PROMOTION: A blend of advertising, personal selling (direct contact), sales promotion (special events), and publicity initiated by the organization to accomplish an organization's marketing objectives.

BRAND: A brand represents the identity and perception of a product, service, or organization. It encompasses visual elements (such as logos and design) as well as intangible aspects (like reputation and values).

MEDIA RELATIONS: Media relations involve managing interactions with journalists, editors, and other media professionals. PR practitioners work to secure positive coverage for their clients or organizations in the news.

SOCIAL MEDIA MARKETING: Social media marketing leverages platforms like Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and LinkedIn to promote products, engage with audiences, and build loyalty.

Remember, these terms often overlap, and context certainly matters. So, whether you're a marketing guru or just dipping your toes into the PR pool, understanding the similarities and differences in these concepts will help you better navigate the ever-evolving landscape of promotion.

WHAT IT MEANS TO RING THE REMISSION BELL!

Ringing the remission bell is a tradition for children with cancer to mark the end of their treatment and the beginning of a new chapter in their lives!

- It's a sign of a time to celebrate the end of a difficult journey and focus on the future!
- It's a symbol of accomplishment!
- It's a source of hope and inspires hope in children towards the future!

The tradition was started at MD Anderson Hospital in 1996. Children's hospitals often have large gold bells for patients and their families to ring. Remission means that a child's cancer symptoms have disappeared or lessened after treatment. However, remission can be partial or complete, and there's always a risk that the cancer will return. After remission, children have regular follow-up appointments and tests to monitor for any signs of the cancer returning.

This year, on October 13th, 2024, Senya Smith, an 11 year old girl from Marquette, who has battled cancer since diagnosed in October of 2021, was able to proudly ring the remission bell at the NMU and MSU basketball game in Marquette. Alongside her were four Northwood

Airlifeline (NWALL) heroes, the pilots that transported Senya by flight to MOTT in Ann Arbor for the care that she needed!



DISTRICT 11-C1 PROJECT KIDSIGHT AND READ BETWEEN THE LIONS



The morning of November 7, 2024, Lion members (9) from Alto, Fruitport, Muskegon Northside, Wyoming Lions Clubs sponsored a Project KidSight Free Vision Screening and Read Between The Lions at Bunker Elementary Schools in Muskegon County.

We screened 432 students and 94 showed one or more eye problems. Children who receive a "Refer" should be examined by an ophthalmologist or optometrist as soon as possible. Read between the Lions screened 58 students.

Lions of Michigan KidSight program is designed to identify treatable and preventable causes of vision loss in children. If diagnosed early 90% of vision disorders can be corrected, however, when vision problems are not detected early, a child's vision can deteriorate to the point of irreversible blindness.

The "Read Between the Lions" is a screening for the eye movements used with readers. The target population for the screening would be those learning to read (grades 1-3) and any students struggling to read up to any grade level.

The unusual part of the screening is there is also a remedial portion for those that struggle with eye movement control. That can be discussed after the screening with you and local Lions.

Our goal is to help children see their best by offering free vision screening at local schools.

We thank Lion members that volunteered their time and Ms. Tiffini Booth that worked with us to make this event successful.






