A lifetime in Lionism reveals something that is not always obvious in the early years. The greatest challenges in leadership rarely come from the projects or the planning or the hours spent organizing service. The real challenge, the one that shapes a leader from the inside out, is learning how to understand the people who serve beside us. This time of year seems to make that truth feel a little clearer. The holiday season has a way of slowing us down just enough to notice what we sometimes overlook. It reminds us to soften our approach, to pause before reacting, and to see the people in front of us rather than just the roles they fill.



Clubs grow stronger when members feel seen. They falter when people feel unheard. Many good Lions have stepped back not because they lacked dedication, but because their concerns went unnoticed or misunderstood. Misunderstandings take root when assumptions replace conversations. Reaction moves faster than reflection, and the meaning behind someone's words gets lost along the way. Every person in a club carries a story that is not always visible. Some carry quiet grief. Some carry doubts about their place. Some carry past hurts that influence the way they speak or how they show up. The holidays can make those weights heavier... or lighter... depending on whether someone feels supported.

Time has shown again and again that listening can shift everything. A gentle conversation can bring a frustrated member back into the fold. A moment of patience can reveal the true reason a volunteer hesitated before taking on a role. A sincere willingness to hear someone out can restore trust that was slipping away. Listening is not a small gesture. It is a gift. One that costs nothing and yet holds tremendous value. Leadership rooted in understanding steadies a club. It eases tension, strengthens commitment, and builds an atmosphere where members feel safe to speak honestly. Decisions become wiser when built on real information rather than assumed motives. Unity grows when people feel valued enough to share what is truly on their minds.

This season invites gratitude. Gratitude for those who show up even when life is heavy. Gratitude for the quiet workers who never ask to be noticed. Gratitude for the disagreements that eventually led to growth. Gratitude for every person who continues to believe in service and in each other. The lesson that emerges through decades of service is simple. Do not decide what someone means until their full story has been heard. Do not react before the facts are clear. Do not let assumptions shape the way members are treated. When leaders choose to listen first, clubs become places where people want to stay. Service becomes more joyful. Relationships deepen. And the spirit of Lionism shines a little brighter... much like the lights of this season... steady, warm, and welcoming to all who draw near.

We did the same thing, she pleaded! It took a while to talk to my stubborn brain, and she was right! Thank goodness. She talked me into being the charter President of the new Lions Club when we chartered our Lioness Club over to a Lions Club, also encouraging my sisters (blood and non-blood) to come with. I think this also paved the way for other Lioness Clubs to make the leap over and bring their years of service with them.

Which brings me to being the District Governor now. Something else I never aspired to do. I only became 1st Vice District Governor to help my husband out as District Governor. I learned so much, and enjoyed helping him so much, I figured I should stick with the plan and continue with the program.



JANUARY IS HUNGER AWARENESS MONTH



LEARN

 Invite a community health professional to visit your club and educate members on the prevalence and impact of hunger in your community.

ACT // BEGINNER

- Support your local food bank by donating time, equipment or food.
- Create a resource list of hunger related volunteer opportunities in your region to share with other clubs in your district.
- Use social media to raise awareness about childhood hunger in your community and to inspire others to become involved.
- Host a healthy eating event at your school, community center or place of worship. Invite a nutritionist as a keynote speaker.
- Deliver nutritious, prepared meals to elderly, disabled or ill community members.
- Serve meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- Donate to organizations that provide micro-nutrient powders to malnourished children.
- Bring a variety of fruits and vegetables to an elementary school class. Explain to the students where the food comes from and encourage them to taste different types of produce.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Volunteer with a "gleaning group" to harvest unpicked fruits and vegetables at farms and orchards.
- Host a grocery store or market tour where a nutritionist gives participants tips on choosing healthy and nutritious groceries.
- Collaborate with a food bank to organize a community food drive, focusing on collecting items most needed in your area.
- Write a cookbook of inexpensive, healthy, easy-to-make recipes.
- Work with your local school to provide weekend take-home bags of nutritious snacks for children in need.
- Sponsor a cooking class for youth to learn basic cooking skills for healthy living.
- Create an online resource on planning and portioning meals to reduce household food waste.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Conduct an assessment of food access in your community.
 Advocate to local government leaders for additional or improved options in areas of need.
- Support pregnant women and new mothers by ensuring there are comfortable, safe and clean areas for them to nurse in the community.
- Use your professional networks to connect food banks to food industry leaders interested in food recovery.
- Develop a program to provide underserved students with food during holiday times when school is not in session.
- Establish a community or school vegetable garden for residents in a food-insecure neighborhood.
- Establish a weekly produce stand in a food desert.
- Create a volunteer transportation program to help individuals and families get to and from grocery stores, food banks and soup kitchens.
- Develop an animal husbandry program where a few families receive a small stock of animals. A portion of the animals' offspring will be given to neighboring families for sustainable growth of the program.

Canine Paratroopers Serve Our Military As our district Leader Dog Co-Chairs, Lion Pam Miller, Leader Dog Floyd, PDG Gretchen Preston were invited to give a Leader Dog presentation to the Swedish Club in Rapid River. We shared a meal with about a dozen mostly elderly gentlemen and talked about Leader Dogs for the Blind and their various programs. One WWII veteran shared his experience as a paratrooper jumping behind enemy lines with his trained military dog strapped to him. Lion Pam and I were amazed. The use of canine paratroopers in military operations has been a significant and often overlooked aspect of warfare. TOUCHSTONE STORY #75 THE GIFT OF HEARING



Lions around the world are working to raise awareness, bring medical care and provide education to help prevent hearing loss. More than 275 million people worldwide are hearing-impaired or deaf, according to the World Health Organization.

Just as vision-related programs have been a key element of Lions Clubs International activities since before Helen Keller called on Lions in 1925 to carry out a "crusade against darkness," Lions have also been prominent in the battle to help people with hearing impairments.

"Blindness separates people from things," she once said, but "deafness separates people from people."

Lions formally identified hearing conservation as a major activity in the early 1970s. That effort gained momentum when Past International President Ralph A. Lynam, who served from 1978 to 1979, designated helping the hearing impaired as his major program

In countries from India to the U.S., Lions have equipped special mobile screening units to screen infants for hearing problems, as early diagnosis is key to learning and socialization. These "hearing vans" go to shopping malls and crowded city neighborhoods.

Lions also offer special camps where children who are deaf can enjoy the outdoors while learning skills that help them to navigate a silent world. Some camps such as Camp Pacifica and the Lions Wilderness Camp for Deaf Children, which opened in California in 1979 and 1980 respectively, specialize in hosting children with hearing impairments. In addition, many

of Lions' summer camps for children who are disabled offer special sessions for children with hearing impairments.

Lions put their experience creating programs to improve sight and prevent blindness to work in creating programs to serve people with hearing loss. Just as Lions collect and refurbish used eyeglasses for distribution, they created the Hearing Aid Recycling Program in 2000 to refurbish and distribute hearing aids.

And just as guide dogs offer remarkable help to people who are blind or visually impaired, Lions help fund programs for dogs to guide people with hearing impairments. These hearing guide dogs are trained to respond to household sounds like a knock on the door, a smoke alarm or even a baby's cry. "We're all ears for the hearing impaired," is the motto of the Lions' hearing dog program in Australia, which trains its own dogs.

Because surgical interventions and equipment can be costly, Lions often provide financial assistance. But aid comes in other forms, too. Lions conduct public-awareness programs to educate their neighbors about protecting hearing and identifying hearing problems in youngsters. Sometimes, that guidance can be priceless.

In the U.S., at the Lions Hearing Center of Michigan in Detroit, Toni Cannon-Mitchell found counseling and free services for her son M.J. after learning he was deaf. Without the help of the Lions facility, which opened in 1999, M.J. wouldn't have made the fine progress he has achieved "and he might not have the bright future he has now," she said.

Membership types and fees

New member

New members pay an entrance fee of US\$35 or must submit the proper waiver certification form. International dues total US\$50 annually. Dues are billed on a semiannual basis. Additional district, multiple district and club dues may apply.

Transfer member

Transfer members in good standing pay no entrance fee when transferring to an existing club within 12 months.

Family membe

The Family Membership Program provides families with the opportunity to receive a special dues discount when they join a Lions club together. The first family member (head of household) pays full international dues (US\$50), and up to four additional family members pay only half the international dues (US\$25). All family members pay the onetime entrance fee of US\$35.

The Family Membership Program is open to family members who are (1) eligible for Lions membership, (2) currently in or joining the same club, and (3) living in the same household and related by birth, marriage or other legal relationship. Common household family members include parents, children, spouses, aunts and uncles, cousins, grandparents, in-laws and legal dependents. Submit via the Lion Portal, or include the Family Unit Certification Form with the Monthly Membership Report

Student

Students between the age of majority and through age 30 pay no entrance fee and half international dues. Students over age 30 and joining a Campus Lions club pay a US\$10 entrance fee and full international dues. Submit the Student Member Certification Form (STU-5) for each student.



Current or former Leo

Current or former Leos seeking membership through the age of 35, who have served as a Leo for at least a year and a day, pay half international dues and receive an entrance/ charter fee waiver under the Leo-Lion membership type program. You may select Leo-Lion as the membership type in the Lion Portal or submit the Leo to Lion Certification form with your MMR.

Leos over age 35 who have served as a Leo for at least a year and a day receive an entrance/charter fee waiver.

Submit the Leo to Lion Certification Form for credit of Leo years of service to the Lion member record for each current or former Leo.

Young adult

Young adults through the age of 30 receive an entrance fee waiver and pay half international dues when joining a Leo-Lions club.






