your message to the local media and, donors. Here are some guidelines both supporting your Lions Club. for recognizing or creating news stories and persuade the media to publish or broadcast those stories to your local stakeholder publics.

A news story is a written or recorded (or, occasionally, live) article or interview that informs the public about current events, concerns, or ideas. Sometimes local media will use exactly what words you give them, but you may not end up writing the final story. Instead, you can provide story ideas to journalists who then flesh out your idea to create the story as it appears on air or in print.

A news story can be long or short, depending on its newsworthiness or interest to people who watch TV, listen to the radio, or read the paper. It may be written, recorded, live, or taped, depending on the medium you use and the timeliness of the story.

Your Lions Club does many newsworthy things that people want to know about.

- Highlight when community members join your club.
- Provide information upcoming service project or event or talk about the results afterward.
- Share the news of fundraisers with your community to be even more
- successful. Get out the news of your support of community youth through academic
- scholarships. Announce your club's milestone anniversary or member chevrons.
- Introduce new officers to the community to help raise awareness of your club.
- members who receive an award. Promote your upcoming Leo club

Recognize an individual or group of

- service project or event.
- Recognize a Leo who has received an award.

For example, your Lions Club's 50th anniversary story could be associated with a local, national, topical, or historical event. A good example of this might be connecting your Lions Club to marking the 50th anniversary of the passage of the Education of the Handicapped Act in 1973 that mandated special education services to children with disabilities. At any rate, an anniversary is an important milestone to celebrate whenever a community-based organization survives

MD11 READING ACTION PROGRAM by Donald Spinks MD11 Have you ever heard of Dyslexia?

Dyslexia is a learning disability in reading. People with dyslexia have trouble reading at a good pace and without mistakes. They may also have a hard time with reading comprehension, spelling, and writing. But these challenges aren't a problem with intelligence. Dyslexia is a common condition that makes it hard to work with language. Some experts believe that between 5 and 10 percent of people have it. Others say as many as 17 percent of people show signs of reading challenges.

People with dyslexia don't outgrow it. But there are teaching approaches and strategies that can help them improve their reading skills and manage the challenges. People of any age can be tested for dyslexia, although the tests are different for adults than for kids. People with dyslexia typically have trouble reading fluently. They often read slowly and make mistakes. That can impact how well they comprehend what they read. But when other people read to them, they often have no problem understanding the text. Dyslexia can create difficulty with other skills, too. These include Reading comprehension, Spelling, Writing and Math. People sometimes believe dyslexia is a problem with vision. They think of it as reversing letters or writing backwards. But dyslexia is an issue with language. It's important to know that while dyslexia impacts learning, it's not a problem of intelligence. People with dyslexia are just as smart as their peers. There are countless stories about people thriving with dyslexia, including actors, entrepreneurs, and elected officials.



But just the simple act of asking the couple from the Congo to pass the name placard around where Sonya his mum described it to him brought beams of light! Man can Keaton talk when given just an opportunity! I got my picture taken with many ambassadors that evening.

The one that I treasure is the one with Keaton and his mum. By the way the next day Keaton addressed the UN. He was the Essay contest winner. It is amazing what Lions can do in service, by just being FUN! At the 11C2 convention I met three remarkable youth. Two of them Leo's

and one getting ready to be onboarded to the Leo program. For the most part, they were just normal kids. When we first met they were bored, sitting around a table, with each of them having their nose in a cell phone. (I refuse to call such technology "smart".) Lions were finishing up breakfast. The youth were long done eating. The penny hadn't dropped yet for me. These kids had a very "adult" purpose that day. DG Traci had them doing the pledge and the prayer to start things off. What an impact! What fine leadership! This was not accidental. It was very simple. Sure, the youth were a bit nervous. For that matter shouldn't we all be a little respectfully nervous during the pledge and the prayer? At the end of the day, the youth got some wonderful experience. In 2019 D-10 created a website to serve Childhood Cancer and Defense Against Diabetes, which changed the face of our district forever. www. uplionsserve.org.

Chairs in Childhood Cancer and Diabetes were successful in obtaining grants, partnering with groups for fund-raising events, and reaching out to club Lions. Donations came flooding in. As bank balances grew, it became



apparent that we needed our own district charitable arm, functioning similar to LCIF, to process donations, provide grants, and to build communities. Our foundation, U.P. Lions Serve was founded in 2021.

Board member Gary Peralashares, "The most important aspect of creating our interactive website is our ability to fund-raise, with the click of the "Donate" button, visitors make a direct, tax deductible contribution to District 10 Global Causes. Our non-profit status opens new opportunities for us to collaborate with philanthropists, and to apply for local, regional, and LCIF grants."
