

- Must be legally blind and provide verification (letter from optometrist or ophthalmologist or letter from vocational counselor).
- Applicants must be a resident of the State of Michigan and a United States Citizen (International students must provide proof of citizenship) and either attending or accepted by an accredited trade or business school, college or university.
- 3. Applicants must complete the official scholarship application (both sides).
- 4. Must submit two letters of recommendation.
- 5. Must submit an essay outlining why you need the scholarship.
- 6. Must have a minimum GPA of 2.5 (transcript required).
- Completed scholarship applications must be postmarked NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 30th annually.
- Must attend the Lions of Michigan Forum to accept scholarship during a ceremonial presentation. (Actual check(s) will be issued to the school/university/equipment manufacturer upon submission of documentation. Two weeks notice required).

Scholarship Selection Process:

- 1. Lions of Michigan Scholarship Committee will review all applications during January.
- 2. This scholarship will be awarded in February annually at the Michigan Forum.



They can use children's jewelry such as beaded bracelets, lip balm, unscented lotions, small toys or games, soft socks, blankets, and hats, hand sanitizer, activity and coloring books and crayons. Michigan Lions Clubs provide advocacy for our clients, and in most cases, the local Lions Club provides additional financial support and services for clients.

Through our KidSight Program, we aim to identify and help restore normal vision to children suffering from undiagnosed vision disorders that affect their ability to perform in school and develop on pace with their classmates. Our hitech mobile vision screeners are programmed to quickly and accurately identify vision disorders such as myopia (nearsightedness), hyperopia (farsightedness), anisometropia (unequal refraction power), astigmatism (optical defect), anisocoria (unequal pupil size) and strabismus (gaze deviations) through noninvasive testing.

When identified early, 95% of vision problems can be corrected, however when vision problems are not detected early, a child's vision can deteriorate, and vision loss can be irreversible. Over time, treatment options diminish, and the cost of reatment increases substantially.

Through our Hearing Screening Program, our objective is to identify and treat hearing problems before they impede a child's learning and development and negatively impact a child or adult's quality of life. Research shows that 15% of children and over 30% of older adults suffer from hearing loss that harmfully affects their daily lives.

Untreated hearing loss will interfere with a child's ability to learn and may cause behavioral issues that will disrupt their academic success and social development, and among older adults, untreated hearing loss is the third highest disabling condition after arthritis and hypertension.

Through our Lions Affordable Hearing Aid Program, we help low-income people with hearing loss maintain self-sufficiency through the provision of affordable hearing aids and audiology services. One in every ten people in our state suffers from hearing loss, which can only be treated with amplification, and without financial help, many people in Michigan cannot afford hearing aids.

Our strong partnerships with hearing aid manufacturers, including GN ReSound, Phonak, Rexton, Starkey and Unitron, audiology groups and hearing specialists and other charities enable us to provide our hearing-impaired clients with all types of digital hearing aids for about twenty percent of the average market cost. Collaboration allows us to keep program costs down and help many more Michigan residents without jeopardizing service quality.

Through our Emergency Individual Assistance Program, we help uninsured and underinsured people who suffer from severe vision and hearing disorders that can only be corrected through surgical intervention or costly medical procedures. Our service agreements and partnerships with ophthalmology groups and medical service providers throughout Michigan ensure that program resources are used efficiently and effectively and that clients receive exceptional care at affordable costs. Funding is determined based on the overall financial and medical needs of the applicant.

Through our Emergency Military Family and Veterans Relief Program, we help current and former military members and their families with financial emergencies. Funding is determined through an application process, and it is based on the financial needs of the applicant.

Through our Emergency Disaster Relief Program, we help people and families affected by natural disasters, including severe storms, flooding, fires and tornados. Funding is determined by the number of individuals and families affected by the disaster and the overall amount of losses incurred. Our service programs are funded with revenue derived from our Lion Mints business, the Sight and Hearing Sweepstakes, donations, and special events. We receive no state or federal government support for our programs.






QUESTIONING YOUR LEADERSHIP ABILITY? BY LION MIKE SCOTT MD11/1181



ARTICLE BY BRENT BERACY - GMT-MD CHAIRPERSON

As your new GMT-MD chairperson, I've had conversations with your Governors, Vice-Governors, GMT's and NAMI champions and I know they are all valuable leaders and resources in each of our districts. As a club member or leader, they're not only available to you as a resource, these hardworking volunteers are working on solutions to strengthen our districts, clubs, and membership. The path to that solution is the North American Membership Initiative (NAMI). As we Opt-In, Build a Team, a Vision, a Plan, and eventually Successes, I am reminded that absolutely NONE of this matters without YOU Lion (Your name here).

Here's an article I wrote some time ago , adapted to remain current, that I believe is more relevant to us as Lions now more than ever:

Why?

This question seems to set most back in their chair... We sat as a group of Lions leaders, brainstorming our Multiple District's (MD) future, pouring over our club health data both current and historical, it is obvious, the MD is at a turning point. Arguments now focused on the direction of that turn, are we going to continue the prevailing trend downwards, closing clubs who are no longer able to serve their communities due to age and dwindling resources, or are we at the bottom of that curve and will soon be seeing new activity, new clubs and a renewed sense of Lions resolve and pride?

If you've taken part in your district's NAMI meetings, you know that we've seen the bottom and are working diligently to reverse that trend. If you haven't yet participated, reach out to your district GMT and join in on the next conversation. Without you, the process just doesn't work as well.

We have recommended the club excellence program to clubs that have seemed to be struggling, suggested canvassing their communities doing needs assessments to be certain that they aren't overlooking certain projects that our communities would benefit from. We've suggested conducting "how are your ratings" surveys and "blueprint for a stronger club" and "Your Club, Your Way" to be certain that our clubs are still serving the needs of its members. We've identified potential communities in which a new Lions Club would be able to provide valuable service and yet our district data remains stagnant.

The MD as a whole we live and breathe our association's motto "We Serve". I can't think of a single Lion that when asked, won't tell you what they do and how they serve or when witnessed doesn't provide an excellent example of how they serve the community. In fact, we as a district are currently serving more needs than ever before just with nearly a third less resources. Yes, we Lions live up to our motto, question is though, do we live up to our mission?

Lions Clubs Mission Statement: "To empower volunteers to serve their communities, meet humanitarian needs, encourage peace and promote international understanding through Lions clubs."

As our meeting was drawing to a close, we considered why our MD was deteriorating, what was causing it and how we were going to fix it. One of our leaders spoke at the end of our meeting and interestingly proposed the following: "What is our reason why?" And that is the question that sat our leaders back in our chairs a little lost for words, you see we were all well versed on what Lions do, and how they do it, but to know "Why" requires one to dig a little deeper.

Author and public speaker Simon Sinek has written a book about "Why" and provides examples such as the Apple Co., the Wright Brothers, and even Martin Luther King to prove his point that



"People don't buy what you do; they buy why you do it." I encourage all Lions to take time to get familiar with Simon by starting a simple YouTube search.

Lions, I believe that what we have been missing or ignoring in our efforts to fulfill our Mission is to focus on our reason "why". It is a deeply personal and emotional reason that each one of us knows, but rarely talks about, we LOVE to serve. When we share our LOVE of Lions and Lionism, we talk straight from the heart, and in turn speak directly to the part of the brain that drives behavior. Love empowers people. Love encourages peace. Love begets understanding. THAT is our Mission! As we continue to introduce potential members into our Lions family, I ask you to lead with your why. It's your "why" that will truly connect you to those you speak with and will quickly help correct our course to fulfill our Mission.

As said by Helen Keller "The best and most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched - they must be felt with the heart."






