




DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S SPOTLIGHT <



She led the organization's largest capital campaign ever, raising \$14.5 million for the new canine development center. In addition, Weisse has grown philanthropic revenue by 121% and estates revenue by 164% during her tenure, enabling greater service provision to clients. She is one of only 117 fundraising executives globally to hold the prestigious ACFRE designation. She has travelled extensively to speak and advocate for the Leader Dog mission and for inclusion and access for people who are blind or visually impaired.

Weisse graduated from the University of Notre Dame and has a master's degree from the University of Glasgow. She is a graduate of the Stanford Graduate School of Business Non-Profit Executive Leadership program and sits on the American Foundation for the Blind board of trustees. Weisse is also a proud member of Lions Clubs International.



HELPING FAMILIES

Helping amputees walk again is just the beginning. Once they are able to care for themselves, it alleviates the need for their families to care for them as much.

IMPROVED MOOD & ESTEEM

- Imagine feeling "whole" again.
- Imagine standing up and looking people eye to eye
- When you can be productive, you have more selfesteem.

From July through November of this year, our Michigan Lions Foundation has provided services and financial support to District 10 and Multiple District 11 Lions Clubs amounting to:

PROJECT KIDSIGHT – 15,840 screened and 1,732 children referred for follow-up eye care. HEARING SCREENING – 170 children and 80 adults have been screened and 19 referred for follow-up care. DIABETIC RETINOPATHY SCREENING – 112 screened and 13 referred for follow-up care. EMERGENCY INDIVIDUAL ASSISTANCE & DISASTER RELIEF – 18 grants totaling over \$32,000 to help people in 9 of 11 Lions of Michigan Districts.

HOSTING STUDENTS IN MICHIGAN

"Hosting" is having the student stay in your home for all or part of the time. Share your culture and experiences as a Michiganders with an international student through our hosting program. Participating students are invited to live as a member of your own family and be part of your day-to-day life.

SUMMER 2024 - APPLICATION DEADLINE 03/30/2024

The Lions Youth Exchange Program was started to provide today's youth, our leaders of tomorrow, an opportunity to learn about people and countries other than their own to promote world peace. The goal is to have each participant return home, apply greater awareness and appreciation of others to fellow students, friends and family. In doing so, we hope to foster harmony and understanding toward goodwill in international relations.

The Lions Clubs International Youth Exchange Program was officially adopted in 1961 as a unique cultural learning opportunity for our youth and not conducted for tourism, formal education or employment. It is promoting World Peace, One Student at a Time.

To our very exceptional and generous host families, we cannot thank you enough. Without you, this program cannot work. You are taking these students to become a part of your family. We would like to recommend that you take two students from two different countries. This is so that they will need to speak English to each other. When taking Japanese students, it is wise to pick an older and younger student so the older can help the younger spea

Upon arrival and before anything else, please explain the house rules to your new family members. This is so that there is no misunderstanding as to whether smoking, drinking, etc. is allowed in your home.

Other suggestions we have are:

1. Your Lion Youth Exchange Chairperson will require you to attend an orientation meeting prior to being accepted as a host family. This meeting will cover Youth Exchange Policies and things to assist you and your student and to become acquainted with our program. Other families will

be there too so that you can get acquainted and share activities together. If you have hosted before, your input will be appreciated to help the new host families.
a) It is required by the Youth Exchange Policy that you accept the visiting youth as a member of your family, not as a guest. Meet your new family member on arrival and share your home with your new son or daughter. They are not to be used as babysitters or housekeepers; however, they should help with chores and to keep their room clean. Males and females should be hosted in separate homes and or bedrooms. They should be provided with a bed not a couch or an air mattress. Youth may share a bedroom with host siblings of the same sex and over 10 years

2. Arrange a schedule of things to do and places to go. Ask your new son or daughter if there is anything special or places they would like to see or do. If you are able, try to accommodate them as you would want your own children to be accommodated if they were also being hosted. They are not, however, to leave your care to travel on their own to other countries, or to travel to meet close friends or family if they are in this country. Match your schedule with your local Lions club or district so as not to overlap planned activities. Keep in mind that you are not a travel agent or tour guide, and the concept of the program is a cultural exchange. Your new family members would like to interact with students their own age if possible. Look to your community and surrounding areas for events other than the Lions events.

Please call your district Lion Youth Exchange chairperson to see if they have a planned itinerary.

- a) Plan to spend time at home getting acquainted with your student. Do not make the hosting period a continuous round of events. Time to rest and relax at home is important for both students and family. They will need time to wash clothes and write in their journals.
- b) The Lions Youth Exchange Program is meant to be a learning experience. Allow your visiting youth to have ample opportunity to learn about the nature of our people, our democracy and our heritage and culture. Be sure to learn about theirs but please do not get political or try to proselytize.
- c) Allow them periods of privacy each day.
- d) Your student should have adequate funds for personal expenses. You will be responsible for their meals and entertainment when you are with them as you are with your own children. When and if they are not with you, the funds they brought should be used for whatever meals, entertainment, and souvenirs they wish to purchase. The students will also be responsible for their own phone bills and any other expenses they may incur in your home. They are not to leave you with any of their bills. If there is a problem, please contact your Lion chairperson. e) It is important that you take your youth to a Lions Club or District meeting, if possible. Arrange with the District Governor or Club President to have your student speak as a program. Your student may have pins and/or banners to exchange with the District Governor or Club President.
- 3. The hosting process is normally four-five weeks but can be split into multiple families. Our international camp (Lions Bear Lake Camp) will be in between hosting periods.

Is Hosting Right for Me?

Are you interested in learning about other cultures and ways of life while sharing your own customs and experiences? Are open-mindedness, tolerance and cultural competence of high importance to you? Do you have a desire to contribute towards peace, international understanding and the creation of global citizenship in youth? If you answered yes to any of these questions, you may enjoy being a host family for the Lions Youth Camps and Exchange (YĆE) Program!

Benefits of Hosting

Hosting an exchange youth is guaranteed to be a rewarding experience because: You experience the joy of sharing your culture and daily customs You learn about the exchange youth's customs and culture You open a new world of possibilities and thinking to the exchange youth You make a new friend - maybe a friend for life

Expectations of a Host Family

Room and Board You are expected to provide room and board for the youth. It is recommended that youth be roomed with youth of similar ages and similar genders. Meals should be balanced and healthy.

Transportation

Typically, you are responsible for all of the youth's transportation during the exchange. Travel may include but is not limited to, transfers to and from the airport or train station, transfers to other Host Families or International Camp, transportation to and from any planned activities by you and/or the Host Club. Financial responsibilities

Payment for cultural activities is dependent on the agreement made between you, the youth and the Host Club. Some programs offer stipends or scholarships for participating Host Families.

Selecting an Exchange Youth

The criteria for selecting youth differs from YCE program to YCE program. Hosting a youth is dependent upon desired age, gender, interests and nationality and upon the availability of the youth meeting those requirements. Your local YCE Chairperson will advise you of available youth or if arranged early enough, may seek a youth meeting your request.

You can learn more about the roles and expectations of a YCE Host Family by checking out the YCE Host Family Handbook!

Host Family Eligibility

Potential Host Families must be screened by the Host Lions Club and YCE Chairperson. The Host Lions Club and local YCE Chairperson must approve all host families. Screening items include, but are not limited to:

Age: Having experience with youth of similar age as the incoming youth. Character: Your family should be understanding, interested in other cultures, open-minded, tolerant and have ability to communicate and/or deal wisely wit youth.

Language ability: It would be helpful if one or more members of your family speaks the youth's language and/or English (most YCE programs require English as the preferred language), and could be necessary in some cases.

Knowledge of the YCE program and policy: Your family should have some familiarity with the YCE program and/or hosting youth. If you are a non-Lion Host Family, you should be well informed on the scope and objectives of Lionism, and

on the YCE program and policy by the local YCE Chairperson. Living conditions: Your family should be able to accommodate an additional person in the home without discomfort or financial burden. Family preferences: Your family are permitted preference regarding the youth's

nationality, language, religion, gender, or age. Availability: It is important that you make sure your family's schedule allows accommodation to spend enough quality time with the youth.
